Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome to our Spring Term newsletter. This term we have focussed on quality assurance. Our regular student voice panels have continued through the term on a range of topics including assessment, staying safe and the house values. In addition to this we have undertaken curriculum reviews in several areas across the school. It has been a privilege to see how your sons and daughters have been progressing in their lessons. During my lesson visits I enjoyed a Yr10 Drama lesson where students reenacted a Blood Brothers scene before then answering a practice exam question about it; I learnt about goal scoring techniques in a Yr 8 netball lesson (when I was at school we just threw the ball and hoped for the best!) and I learnt several fascinating things about the Sahara Desert in a Yr 9 Geography lesson to name just three. Did you know that the Sahara only gets 76 mm of rainfall per year? I have been reflecting on how fantastic that must be whilst doing several wet lunch break duties this term.

Our students in Yr 8 and 10 have taken part in the Hampshire #BeeWell survey which gave us good feedback about the views of our students compared to Yr8 and 10 students across Hampshire. We learnt that our students spend less time on social media than other students and that they feel less anxious than other students who completed the survey. Bullying was also highlighted by Ringwood students less often than it was by students in other schools across Hampshire. We were pleased to read this as we continually work to develop our anti bullying stance. We will be looking at this issue closely through the surveys detailed below.

We have asked you for your views of the school via the Kirkland Rowell survey sent out this month. Thank you for completing this. Staff are also completing a Kirkland Rowell survey too. It is so helpful to receive feedback to highlight the areas of success and, more importantly, the areas for improvement for us to turn our attention to as we begin to plan for next year. I look forward to sharing survey information with you in the summer term. To supplement the information from parents and from staff, we will undertake the Kirkland Rowell survey for students in the summer term.

I wish students preparing for their public exams this summer all the best during the Easter holidays as they step up their revision. Remember it is important to rest as well. To everyone else, I wish you all a restful Easter break and hopefully the weather will be kind and we can enjoy being outdoors.

I look forward to welcoming your children back to school on Monday 15th April.

Internet Safety Day 2024

Safer Internet Day 2024 took place on the 6th February 2024, with celebrations and learning based around the theme 'Inspiring change? Making a difference, managing influence and navigating change online'. Students received input through assembly as well as through discussions during tutor time.

One of the key actions for students was to consider changing their settings in WhatsApp so that other people were unable to add them to group chats without their permsisson. This can ensure children aren't added without their consent, sharing both their mobile number and image with others. It's easy to do this by going to SETTINGS - PRIVACY - GROUPS.

Our recent BeeWell survey has highlighted that

students are finding it hard to sleep, with only 33% of our Year 10 girls saying that they slept well. This role works alongside the school's Designated Safeguarding Lead to evaluate the effectiveness of the school's safeguarding arrangements. In practice, this means working with Miss Adams at least once a term to ensure all policies and procedures are in place, being followed and that there is a safeguarding culture in the school. I ask lots of questions when I come in and ensure that appropriate action is taken to safeguard children and promote their wellbeing. I also ensure that safer recruitment process are being followed when the school employs new staff.

Safeguarding young people has to be at the heart of all decisions we make as a school and I am pleased to see that there is such a strong culture at Ringwood School.

On the school's new website there is a safeguarding button at the top of the home page. If you click on this, it will take you a page full of useful information and places you can access support, including who the safeguarding team are at Ringwood and how you can report a concern. 

Technology News

On Friday 8th March I took a group of 11 Ringwood students to BCS for a STEM challenge, where the pupils worked against the clock all day in small teams to solve a problem set in the morning. Each team was asked to come up with a design solution by creating a portfolio of design ideas and annotations and a 3d model. The task was to create a structure that would cross a ravine by wire to drop much needed aid, working on behalf of the charity ShelterBox. There were 12 schools involved on the day with hundreds of 13-18 year olds making up the teams on a complex challenge involving model making and electronics using motors and switches for reversing.

The Ringwood KS3 (Year 9) team were: Rohan Smith, Ollie Hebdon and Matt Butcher who were the epitome of teamwork and resilience on the day.

The Ringwood Key Stage 4 (Year 10) team were: Izzy Hodge, Hugo Melling, Lewis Miller and Katie Gyles. These guys came first winning the school a £300 cheque and a goody bag each from the main sponsors of the event BAE systems, which included a £30 book voucher each. This is the THIRD year running that Ringwood have won this age group!

The Year 12 team also placed and came third, they were: Tom Robold, Leia Metcalfe-Williams, Aidan Pomeroy, Frank Chappels.

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Going back to school after a break

As the holidays come to a close, for some students, the thought of going back to school can make them feel anxious and nervous. Here are some things you can do to make going back to school easier and less stressful for you and your child.

- Chat about school in your ordinary everyday conversations as the holidays come to an end.
- Keep it light and keep it positive.
- Ask how they're feeling about it and whatever they tell you, accept, validate and normalise their feelings e.g. "You're right, it is a bit nervewracking on your first day back same for me and work. I bet there are 30 other kids in your class feeling exactly the same."
- Plan a few interesting things to do in the evenings and at weekends in the next term to give them something to look forward to and

remind them that school is only a part of their week.

- Establish a routine 'family feedback' time where everyone can air and share worries from their day, as well as the fun things that went on. This could happen over dinner time and involve questions like, "What was the silliest moment of your day? What was the most interesting fact you learnt today? Did anyone say anything kind or mean?" Have a look at more conversation starters here for ways you can encourage your child to talk about how they're feeling.

Teach them some simple breathing/grounding techniques and exercises to use at school if they feel anxious during the day.

Red Nose Day 2024


This Red Nose Day the Art Department have led a wonderfully creative Red Nose Challenge #REDNOSEDOODLE

Year 12 Space Masterclass

We were lucky enough to host a Space Masterclass all day for Year 12 Physics students run by the UK Space Agency.

Topics were covered such as;

- Getting into space rocket propulsion, escape velocity and gravitational fields
- Human survival in space effects of low pressure on the human body, investigating astronaut suits, measuring your mass in space
- Spectroscopy how we can use line spectra and the John Webb telescope to search for life on other planets

It was a really practical masterclass - students were hands on all day: making rockets, using diffraction gratings to look at light sources, and trying on a Russian cosmonaut suit. Students were really inspired to follow careers in the growing UK space industry.



There has lots going on in the drama department this term! After the success of theatre trips to see Metamorphosis and The Woman in Black last term, we have again taken all Year 10 to 13 drama students to see enriching productions in the last few weeks. GCSE Drama visited the Mayflower Theatre to see their set text 'Blood Brothers' come to life, with Amber being excited to recognise the actor playing Mrs Lyons (Sarah-Jane Buckley); when Amber was 10, she acted in panto at Bournemouth Pavilion and Sarah-Jane was the Fairy Godmother!







We also took Year 10,12 & 13 to see The Government Inspector by Splendid Productions at MAST, which was a really inspiring production, and Gracie was pleased to be able to meet Kerry Frampton- their Artistic Director. The Splendid team will visit the Drama department in June to run a workshop with Y10 & 12 to help them develop their devising pieces.

Year 9 Drama Club gave a fantastic performance of their own adaptation of The Government Inspector to parents and friends back in February. The students effectively brought out the comedy, but also a modern twist on the message of Gogol's original from 1836.

Year 8 Drama Club are hard at work rehearsing for their production of Scary Playto be presented in May, and Year 7 have just auditioned for 'Twisted Tales'. Over 70 students will be involved in this summer production to be performed in The Barn in July; tickets will go on sale soon.




Following on from the success of the Secret Book Santa, students have been able choose books to have a 'blind date' with. Book are chosen based on a few keywords and genre rather than cover or author.










