Internet Safety Day 2025

Celebrating Internet Safety Day & Introducing Our New Year 7 Mobile Phone Policy

On 11th February 2025 our school took part in Internet Safety Day, a global event dedicated to promoting safer and more responsible internet use for young people. This year's theme focuses on on-line scams and hoaxes, encouraging students to be mindful of their on-line presence, understand digital risks, and make positive choices in the on-line world.

'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams on-line'

As we prepare for the next academic year, we are also introducing a new mobile phone policy for Year 7 students, starting in September, restricting Year 7 students to non-smartphones only during their first year. This decision follows concerns raised through the latest research and most notably in the Channel 4 documentary Swiped, which highlighted the negative impact of smartphones on young people's mental health. The policy also aligns with the growing national conversation around children's smartphone use,

as reflected in the proposed Safer Phones Bill currently under discussion in Parliament.

Why This Change?

Mental Health: Smartphone use is contributing to rising mental health issues in children.

Better Sleep and Learning: Reducing screen time helps improve sleep and academic performance.

Social Media Concerns: Many students access social media platforms before the age of 13, exposing them to harmful content.

We hope this initiative will encourage wider discussions among parents, educators, and policymakers about the best ways to support children in navigating the digital world safely and responsibly.

Helping Your Child Return to School After the Easter Break

- Prepare Early Gradually adjust sleep routines and talk positively about school
- Acknowledge Feelings Listen to their worries and reassure them that nerves are normal.
- Keep Mornings Calm A predictable routine helps reduce anxiety.
- Take Small Steps Arranging a meet-up with a friend can ease the anxiety.

- Encourage and Praise Focus on small successes
- Stay Connected Keep in touch with school staff and ask for extra support if you need it.

Art News: Ringwood School hosts the annual Rotary Club of Ringwood inter-school photography competition

The Art department hosted its 12th annual Inter-school Photography Competition on Tuesday 11 March. The one-day event saw more than 900 entries from 32 schools across Hampshire, Dorset, and Wiltshire in three different age categories from year one up to year 13 with an additional adult category for parents and teachers.



Sponsored by Arts University Bournemouth (AUB), the Royal Photographic Society, and the Rotary Club of Ringwood, the annual competition has grown year on year as Mr Fielder, Head of Art at Ringwood School explains, "The competition started 12 years ago when the Ringwood Rotary club sought to work with us to produce a calendar for charity with photographs from the New Forest, this turned into a competition for the students with the winning shots being used for the calendar.

"Over the next couple of years, other schools found out what we were doing and asked to be a part of it, and it's just grown and grown from there. The Rotary are still very supportive but we don't make a calendar any longer and the photos aren't restricted in terms of subject."

Judges included Mrs Emily Weston, Photography Course Leader at Ringwood school, Dr Geoff Ridgway and Trevor Pogson from Ringwood Rotary, Dr Barry Senior from the

Royal Photographic Society, and Joshua Read, the Course Leader of the Foundation, Art & Design Diploma at AUB.

"It's been a privilege and a real labour of love to watch this competition grow to the size it now is. Photography is the most accessible art form of all, and inclusivity is what my team and I are all about. Our passion has been matched by colleagues from the other 24 participating schools.

The theme this year was 'Layers', and the overall title of Young Photographer of the Year was awarded to Billy Dixon-Clarke from Trafalgar school by ex-Ringwood student and professional photography Max Cheshire.

Austin Jeffries Year 10 was awarded the Royal Photographic Society special award in his age category; Freddie Serle Year 11 was awarded Winner in the Year 11 to 13 category, whilst Amy Evans Year 12 was Runner-Up.

Mr Fielder adds. "The exhibition looked fantastic: we hired professional display equipment, the photographs were printed on high-grade A1 and A2 foam boards and the students were thrilled to see their work presented professionally. And I'd like to commend everyone that entered, there were some brilliant pieces there and I know it made for very difficult judging."



#BeeWell Survey 2024: What You Told Us

In November, Year 9 and Year 10 students took part in the #BeeWell survey, a programme designed to measure young people's wellbeing and drive positive change in schools and communities across Hampshire, the Isle of Wight, Portsmouth, and Southampton. This year, an incredible 19,723 students from 75 schools participated, providing valuable insights into their experiences and needs. Here are some of the outcomes from the survey:

What's Going Well Year 10? Friendships & Social Support: Year 10 students reported above-average levels of peer support,

reported above-average levels of peer support, with girls especially feeling well-supported by their friends.

What Needs Attention?

Sleep: A major concern, especially among Year 10 girls, with 60.5% reporting they don't get enough rest. Poor sleep impacts concentration, mood, and overall wellbeing.

Access to support: Many students know where to get help but don't feel comfortable discussing mental health concerns or believe they can access support when needed.

How Can We Improve?

- Prioritising sleep by reducing screen time before bed and maintaining a consistent routine.
- Encouraging open conversations about mental health and breaking down barriers to accessing support.

What's Going Well Year 9?

Year 9 students reported higher than average self-esteem and lower emotional difficulties, showing a generally positive outlook on life.

What Needs Attention?

Relationships with Staff: A key concern, with students feeling less supported by adults in school.

Attendance & Punctuality: The second lowest across all year groups, affecting learning and relationships with teachers.

How Can We Improve?

- Building mutual respect with staff through positive interactions and restorative conversations.
- Encouraging responsibility and engagement in lessons.

We look forward to working with all students to gather more feedback about how we can support further in these areas.




WORLD BOOK DAY 2025

The students enjoyed their visit so much that we are hoping to return in the summer!




What is the strangest, most extreme or bizarre place you can find to read during the Easter break?






We have recently swapped out almost 200 books with our School Library Service.

BLIND DATE WITH A BOOK




Following on from the success of the Secret Book Santa, students have been able choose books to have a 'blind date' with. Book are chosen based on a few keywords and genre rather than cover or author.



















We are looking for volunteers to join our Governing Board
