## Students support long-running community appeal to help the homeless this Christmas

Students from across all year groups at Ringwood School have come together to support some of the most vulnerable members of our community by collecting over 2400 tins of food and essential supplies for those facing homelessness over the Christmas period.

The appeal, which has been running for more than 30 years, was established by the late former Mayor of Ringwood, Danny Cracknell.



His vision was to ensure that nobody in the local community would go without during the harsh winter months - a legacy that continues to inspire and bring people together year after year.

Our Sixth Form students worked alongside members of the Salvation Army to sort, pack, and prepare the donated items for distribution. The collaborative effort saw tins of food, hygiene products, and other essentials organised with care and compassion, ready to be delivered to individuals and families in need.

This appeal is a powerful example of what can be achieved when young people unite with a common purpose. Our students have shown empathy, generosity, and a willingness to give up their time to support others. We are incredibly proud of their commitment to keeping Danny Cracknell's tradition alive.

The donations brought in by students



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demonstrate not only kindness, but a strong sense of community spirit, reflecting the values that underpin both

## Celebrating a Vibrant Autumn Term of House Events

Our Inter-House Sports events also brought fantastic engagement, with students demonstrating not only athletic ability but also sportsmanship and team pride. The Cross Country competition, always a test of resilience, was met with determination from every House. The triumphant Houses for each Year group were: Year 7 – Nightingale; Year 8 – Hardy; and Year 9 – Anning. A great spread of results.

To keep the momentum going throughout the term, we also ran a series of lunchtime challenges, which offered a range of activities and friendly rivalries created. These included a Flag Identification Quiz, where geographical knowledge was put to the test; a Drawing Challenge, which encouraged quick creativity and a particularly entertaining physical activity—Pass the Ball Around Your Waist—where students attempted as many rotations as possible in 30 seconds. These bite-sized competitions added a burst of fun to the school day and offered students from different year groups the chance to mix, collaborate, and earn valuable points for their Houses.



A special moment this term was part of our whole-school contribution to Remembrance Day. Students

worked thoughtfully and respectfully to cut out poppies and decorate the student entrance, creating a striking and poignant display. The installation served as an important reminder of the significance of remembrance and demonstrated the compassion and care within our school community.

For the second year running the House Captains ran a Christmas Fayre, which proved to be both festive and charitable. Students helped raise funds for their chosen local House Charities by purchasing delicious Krispy Kreme doughnuts, gifting candy canes to friends, and taking part in a variety of 20p games. This year we have built really good relationships with new employers, who would all like to return next year. We look forward to extending our success into 2026.



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


### Successful Practice Interviews at School

The Duke toured the university's world-leading silicon photonics facility, where he met academics and students working at the cutting edge of technology with applications in data centres, healthcare, artificial intelligence, and quantum technology.

As part of his tour, the Duke spoke with our students who had taken part in a hologram workshop with the university. He was keen to hear about their projects, interests, and future aspirations.

Ava said: "He asked us how it works and what we are interested in doing in the future."

Katie added: "It was really nice speaking to him, he was very lovely. He asked about our DofE Awards. I was very excited, and definitely nervous, and it ended up going really well."

They were joined by fellow students Finn Marshall, Marcus Burnay, Matt Budd and Owen Cooper, who also shared their experiences and future plans with the Duke.

Finn explained: "He was interested in what we were doing at school, our future plans and what we wanted to do at university. He asked about the DofE Awards. He was pleased to hear I had a Silver – it was actually the first thing he asked. We showed him some of the different

applications of photonics."

The students' visit was part of their involvement with CORNERSTONE, the University of Southampton's silicon photonics prototyping foundry, which collaborates with industry to develop cutting-edge applications for telecommunications and healthcare.

Search for "Ringwood School" on the app.




## 12 BOOKS OF CHRISTMAS




## HAMPSHIRE BOOK AWARDS WINNER WEBINAR
