## Welcome to Ringwood News

Dear Parents and Carers.

As we come to the end of another busy school year, I want to thank you all for your continued support and partnership. This year has brought with it a great deal of hard work, progress, and many proud moments – from academic successes to sporting achievements, performances, the Colour Run and the everyday effort our students put into their learning.

Watching our young people grow in confidence, maturity and ambition has been a real highlight, and I'd like to commend them all for the courage and ambition they've shown throughout the year.

We really appreciate your support in helping students take responsibility for being well-prepared for learning. It's a small but important step in building good habits and pride in their work.

We look forward to welcoming Year 7 and Year 12 students back to school on Wednesday 3rd September. The rest of the school will return on Thursday 4th September.

## UKMT Junior Maths Challenge 2025 (JMC)

At the start of May, some of our Year 8 students took part in a national competition – the Junior Maths Challenge. This was a one-hour paper that the students took under exam conditions. The questions were designed to challenge them to think logically and solve problems, while using their maths skills.

Nationally, half of all students were awarded a bronze, silver or gold certificate. Ringwood students did exceptionally well with 73% of our students gaining a bronze, silver or gold certificate this year, well above the national average.

# Proud to Support the Smartphone-Free Childhood

At Ringwood School, we are proud to be part of the Smartphone-Free Childhood movement—a growing national campaign that supports families in delaying smartphone access for children until they are ready.

We know that the teenage years are a time of incredible growth and development, and we believe in helping our students navigate this time safely and confidently. As educators and parents, many of us are concerned about the impact of smartphones on mental health, sleep, focus, self-esteem and exposure to harmful content. That's why we're standing alongside thousands of other schools and families across the UK in encouraging a smartphone-free childhood.

The movement is based on a simple but powerful idea: strength in numbers. Many parents feel alone in the decision to delay giving their child a smartphone, especially when "everyone else" seems to have one. Three Ringwood students, Rose, Zach and Zach, received a gold certificate, and Rose did so well that she qualified for the next round - 'The Kangaroo' by achieving 117 marks out of a possible 135. She sat the Kangaroo in June; a similar format but with harder questions and was awarded a Certificate of Qualification.

Well done to all of our Year 8 participants. We hope you found it a fun challenge!



Smartphone-Free Childhood helps to build a community of like-minded parents who are making the same decision—showing young people that it's not just their family saying no, and that delaying access is a perfectly normal and healthy choice.

# Comfort, care, and confidence: helping students through periods

At Ringwood School, we are committed to supporting all aspects of our students' wellbeing — including managing periods. We understand that periods can be embarrassing, uncomfortable or even distressing at times, especially for younger students or those experiencing them for the first time. That's why we offer a range of practical support to help ensure students can continue with their education confidently and comfortably.

#### What We Offer:

- Free sanitary products are available from the medical room at any time — students just need to ask. This includes new underwear and tights.
- A dedicated toilet is available within the medical team if they need help or advice. As medical room for those who need more privacy or time to manage their period needs. medical team if they need help or advice. - Paracetamol and/or Ibuprofen can be provided, if we have received parental

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# Governor News

My name is Claire Gorzanski and I have been a Governor at Ringwood School since June 2022. I became a Governor because I wanted to make a positive difference to improving education and the wellbeing of students and staff by drawing on my experience gained whilst working in the NHS.

Governors are responsible, in collaboration with the Headteacher and the Senior Leadership Team, for setting the strategic direction of the school. Governors hold the headteacher to account for ensuring students receive an outstanding education, aimed at achieving excellent GCSE and A level results and are prepared for life beyond education.

A day in the life of a school governor can vary depending on the area of interest and particular responsibilities assigned to a governor. As chair of the Student Welfare Committee, I attend Student Voice sessions to listen directly to students about their experience in education and their ideas for improvement. A session on PSHE showed students felt the topics were right but they needed more on managing personal finances. Further finance sessions were added the following year. Another session on the usefulness of the student diary highlighted that it needed to be slimmed down and was most useful for Year 7 students. The outcome has been that student diaries are kept for Year 7, but withdrawn for the rest of the year groups.

Governors often have a specific focused area, mine is as an anti-bullying lead. I met with 6 student anti-bullying ambassadors to hear firsthand the work they have done to raise awareness, support peers, promote kindness

and prepare a student charter. Safeguarding is a key responsibility and governors must ensure the school has policies in place to protect children from harm. One such policy recently agreed was the Student Mobile Technology policy. From September 25, year 7 students will not be able to have smart phones in school.

The Full Governing Board meets three times a year and one of the key roles is to oversee the school's budget to ensure that public money is spent wisely. Governors approve the annual budget, make sure monies are allocated fairly and ask questions about spending decisions. Governors are also involved in monitoring student progress and if results are not as expected, the Headteacher will give further details and provide an improvement plan.

I am proud to be a member of the Governing Body and see first hand the impact that a wellled school has on supporting the students to achieve the best possible outcomes and to meet their future aspirations.



#### Languages Round Up Year 10 Normandy trip

Mrs Gilbert, Mr Burke and Mrs Stevens were excited to take 27 French students to Normandy. We got to explore Le Mont St Michel, a goats' cheese farm where we met and held the goats, we visited a market and requested to buy (mainly jewellery) in French, we learnt the history of the landing beaches in Arromanches and even got to taste 'escargots' and 'cuisses de grenouille'.



#### Year 9 and 10 Málaga trip

This activities week, Miss Martin and Mrs Stevens were privileged to take 12 students to Málaga to explore the real Spanish culture and to practise our Spanish. The students really took themselves out of the comfort zone from the start by trying tapas they have never tried before - think octopus tentacles! We saw and did so much over the four days - we visited a traditional market, went shopping, visited the cathedral, saw a Flamenco show, went to Granada and saw La Alhambra, went to the beach and toured a bullring learning about its history (Millie and Maecie had a go at being torera) and we even saw a famous bullfighter practising for his next fight. The students made me so proud because they spoke so much Spanish ordering their own ice cream,

dinner and buying their souvenirs (again mainly jewellery!).

Ten year 10 French and Spanish students entered the Oxford University competition in translation, translating authentic French and Spanish texts into English in a creative way. They each earned five house points. Felix Gobell won a commendation - out of 22,000 entries across the UK! Nous sommes très fiers de toi!

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#### Another year of fabulous fieldtrips with the Geography Department

It's been another busy year of fieldtrips for the Geography department, running visits in other parts of the world, other parts of the country, and closer to home.

Year 13 A Level Geographers to Slapton Sands Field Study Centre in Devon. The students carried out a range of investigations in coastal, woodland and urban environments, so that they were well-equipped to begin their independent A Level investigation (NEA) upon returning to school.

Year 11 GCSE Geographers in October. Each Geography class spent a day in Swanage, Dorset, carrying out physical and human geography investigations so that they were well-prepared for their Paper 3 Geographical Applications. The weather was kinder to us this year (we didn't need to shelter in ancient alleyways from the unforgiving winds). The students successfully collected data for their physical geography study, investigating the effectiveness of coastal management techniques; the human geography study involved a study into the importance of tourism to the Swanage economy.

We also took Year 11 Geographers to Iceland. Our very first stop after arriving was to see the recent lava flow at Grindivik. which had made global headlines; Mrs Wooster could barely contain her joy at seeing first-hand the newest land on the planet (a real boon for a geologist!). Amongst the natural marvels, we visited the Kerid crater – a caldera created by a collapsed volcano; several waterfalls; hot springs and geysers at Geysir; relaxed in the Secret lagoon a geothermal open air pool; Thingvellir National Park – a walk along the edges of tectonic plates and site of the world's first parliament; beaches

of volcanic sand and incredible coastal landforms of columnar jointing; a spot of souvenir shopping at Vik; a trip to an ice-cream farm; and a glacier. As if this wasn't incredible enough, we were treated to two amazing nights of the aurora borealis and shooting stars – making the whole experience just magical.

Year 12 A Level Geographers carried out their coastal fieldwork in November, visiting multiple locations around Christchurch Bay to observe and record coastal processes and evaluating a range of coastal management strategies that protect the coastline in this area - from Avon Beach to Hurst Spit.

Year 10 GCSE Geography Urban Issues investigation in Southampton.. This involved all Year 10 Geography classes investigating the changing social and economic characteristics of different areas of the city. As ever, the West Quay lunch stop was popular with many, and the trip ended with us all 'walking the Walls', seeing the historic heart of Southampton.

As ever, our students have been exceptional. We have enjoyed spending the days with them, talking Geography and witnessing their curiosity with the world around them. They have been wonderful ambassadors for the school and it has been an absolute pleasure to be able to provide these memorable opportunities to study real Geography 'in the field'.

#### **Brilliant Club**

We are very proud of a group of Year 9 and 10 students who have graduated from The Scholars Programme, run by education charity The Brilliant Club. The hard-working students produced challenging university-style essays exploring 'Immunity or Impunity? Challenging legal loopholes.'

The Scholar's Programme is a national university access programme. The students were encouraged to think and work independently across seven tutorials with a subject expert PhD researcher from Southampton University. The project helps students to develop key skills for university and later in life, such as critical thinking, as well as finding out a bit more about higher education.

At their graduation ceremony at Southampton University, they got to meet and talk to university students as well as getting a tour of the campus.



#### Bournemouth University

A group of year 7 students got to visit
Bournemouth University this term. The students
found out about what university is, they went on
a tour round the campus, had a chance to talk
to undergraduates and ask them any questions
they might have about university life. Students
also got to take part in a robotics challenge,
building and programming their lego robots.



# Health Professions Taster Day -Southampton University

This interactive Taster Day for year 10 and 12 considering studying a healthcare course was hosted on Highfield Campus. Students were told about the key skills and competencies required for all healthcare professions, as well as some tips on applying and for interviews. They then went on to four interactive sessions in Audiology, Midwifery, Nursing or Occupational Therapy. This included time on the Universities simulation wards where the students had a go at incubating patients (dummy ones!) and taking blood pressure readings. They also visited the occupational health sensory room.











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#### Careers Round up Work Experience 2025

We have had one of the best years so far for work experience this year. With 100% of Year 10s and 96% of Year 12s going out on placement, we are proud of everyone who has taken part.

Learning a new system to load called Unifrog has streamlined our processes and made things transparent for every Student, Parent and Employer. Well done to you all.

More and more Employers are realising the benefit of work experience. Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, and most Employers have agreed to host again for 2026!

year we have new Exhibitors ranging from Solicitors, Engineering, Universities and The Army.



# ALL CHANGE IN THE NON-FICTION SECTION! The library has had another move around - this time in the non-fiction section!

These zines, along with a selection from last year will be getting their own shelf in the library over the summer - watch this space!



















